
Ruataniwha Update August 2023

The process of removing wilding pines from the precinct is on-going and the continued to remove undergrowth from under and round the more established trees to provide shade and parking at the back of the trailer park.

The area shown on the left is unrecognisable from the dense wall of young saplings that were previously growing on the back side of the road behind the toilet block.



In the near future this will be levelled along with the bund along the back. Once covered with top soil and grass sown, this will provide more room for trailers and better access to the parking area behind



The shot to the left similarly is the area further east towards the compound. It is hoped this will be as well utilised as the areas further west were last season, once the undergrowth was removed.

Over the winter local contractors have been dumping fill in the low area in the trailer park.





Thanks to the generosity of a number of

individuals, clubs and schools the first of 30 trees were planted in the boat park. Twelve upright English Oaks were planted last weekend and between each oak a Chinese Elm will be planted along with

more oaks at the next work weekend in November.

The picture shows the line of trees along the road side with the trees placed at the end of every second line of racks. The same will be planted on the lake side of the boat park and in time will provide good shade for rowers and coaches alike.

The small excavator was a welcome aid, the holes would have been an impossible task by hand.

During the tree removal some racks were removed or damaged and during the weekend refurbished racks were erected.

These are the cross members of the old racks with some modifications. there are now 4 tiers on the small boat racks, 1x's and 2x's, to increase the capacity of the boat park. While the small boat cross arms



can be a little closer

allowing a 4 tier racks, this will not be possible for the big boats. In addition each cross arm has a cleat welded on the end to stop boats and ties slipping off in the wind.

Eventually most of the racks will be re-sited with each type of rack distributed evenly across the boat park to allow

clubs and schools to rack their boats in one area. We are awaiting the outcome of a funding application that, if successful will see and additional 40 racks erected. After the tree removal areas of the boat park look as though racks have been removed, but in fact the current capacity is only just below what it was, the gaps are where the trees were.
