Ruataniwha Update May 2025

As has been the case over the last few years, when events for the season are completed a number of work projects begin. The last event for the season was the New Zealand University Rowing Championships held over Easter and the following week contractors moved on site to begin the eagerly awaited irrigation system upgrade.

Stage 1 of the project will see all underground piping installed and sprinklers installed in priority areas, namely the grassed area in front of regatta control, the newly planted bunds behind the tent sites, the lawn areas at the entrance including the vendor area, the boat park, launch bank and the concert area to the north of the bund. As funds permit there is potential to purchase sprinklers for the trailer park and the spectator bank beyond the rope fence.

Up until now only limited sections of the grounds have been serviced by

our irrigation system and with the increase in plantings over recent years this has resulted in an increased workload for our custodian, Kelvin Maker. Kelvin has been filling containers on the back of the trailer and going round to water trees and shrubs. While other areas can be watered using K-Line, this has to be moved regularly to gain coverage.

Work is progressing well and includes the purchase of a new pump, owing to the failure of the previous unit. Although installation will be completed by mid-May, the system will not be commissioned until September, with winter on the way it is thought unwise to charge the system only to have to drain it for winter frosts.

A huge list of jobs was produced for the week with little expectation of completion, however, not only were almost all jobs completed, some identified as a wet day task still remains to be done, but due to the wonderful autumn weather all outside jobs were completed plus a few more added over the week.

One of the larger projects was the completion of the planting along the bunds at the back of the tent sites. Sophie Strachan has lead this project which began with the reshaping of the bunds this time last year.

In total 1500 native plants and 96 trees were planted over the week. Unfortunately for the team, favourable growing conditions recently meant a lot of weeding needed to be done before the planting could take place. South Island Rowing is indebted to Upper Waitaki Water Zone (UWWZ) Committee for their generous grant to purchase the native plants. The upgrade of the boat park has been a two year project, initially the wilding pines were removed to create space for additional racks, then existing racks had to be progressive moved to make the space more uniform. Lastly 70 new steel uprights needed to be installed to significantly increase boat

park capacity. During the working B, the last of the existing racks were re-sited and 20 new uprights were added. Unfortunately when the old racks were reconfigured it was identified that we were still 6 uprights short. They are now ordered and will be in place for the new season.

Another significant job for the week was the cleaning and painting of all the demarcation buoy lines around the course. While the course buoys are cleaned each year, some of the other buoy lines had that neglected look. Geoff Taggart and Charlie Crampton with others removed the buoys, then bought then back for cleaning and painting by the shore team. The Didymo in the lake makes this a messy job but Robyn Crampton lead a team of determined scrubbers and painters to bring them back to life.

There were numerous other tasks undertaken during the week, unfortunately many will go unnoticed, but never the less are essential to keep the course looking smart and running smoothly. The wood that keeps to accommodation and social areas warm for example has to be cut, split and stored so that a good supply of dry wood is on hand. A big thank you goes to all involved.
